Health & Safety, Quality and Environment

Construction & Building

It is reassuring to know we are employed by a company who is so committed to continual improvement, including the standards of health and safety. Construction sites in general still continue to be one of the most dangerous places to work. Each and every task on site requires careful planning as the work progresses to ensure a safe outcome.

Safety on site used to be more of a technical challenge, but these days technology is overcoming these challenges. For example, work at height is reduced by assembling components at ground level and use of powered access platforms instead of ladders as the preferred method. However, the challenge continues on dealing with the human factors such as why people fail to work safely either through misunderstanding instructions, not concentrating, acting the fool, failing to comply with site rules, or ignoring obvious hazards at risk to others and themselves.





To combat these human issues we need to look at human behaviour and other factors affecting human performance such as fatigue and stress. By understanding people's jobs in more detail and the equipment they use, we can start to understand more why failings occur. All good sites start the day with a morning briefing for all. This is being enhanced on many projects by noting the pertinent points of the daily activities on a "white board". This is then supported by more briefings and discussions during the working day on the methods of work and dealing with site hazards. This in turn encourages better communications between one another and with site management with a positive effect on health and safety.

Following on from the article above by Olav Lawrence, human factors and behaviours are also being looked into at Raymond Brown Aggregates & Waste Solutions.

A number of internal presentations and workshops on the importance of communication have been recently completed by our site managers and supervisors.

Communication or "soft skills" are as important as technical competence in ensuring that any task is undertaken safely, especially when we are briefing others or asking for their involvement in assessing risks and developing safe systems of work. An example of this could be, asking the question "why", this is always a good way of encouraging involvement. If you are curious then answers and information will usually be forthcoming. When asking aggressively, defences can go up with little response or cooperation.

By using these simple techniques in communication (and many more in a similar vein), we can all modify our behaviours in such a way as to influence our "safety culture".



The Royal Southern Yacht Club was honoured today by the presence in Hamble of its Patron, HRH The Duke of Edinburgh, for the Commissioning ceremony of the newly completed Prince Philip Yacht Haven.

Three years ago, His Royal Highness had graciously lent his name to this project to transform the Club's waterfront and, having been shown the plans on his last visit, was viewing the completed development for the first time.

Accompanied by the Vice Lord-Lieutenant of Hampshire, Mrs. Lindsay Fox, Prince Philip was welcomed to the Royal Southern Yacht Club by its Commodore, Mr. Christopher Mansfield, before meeting Flag Officers and Members of both the Royal Southern and its neighbour, the Royal Air Force Yacht Club, a partner in the waterfront project.

Later, His Royal Highness met the Chairman of the group responsible for the Haven development, Past Commodore Mr. Mark Inkster, and its members, together with representatives from Raymond Brown Construction Ltd's Southern Division, Marina Projects Ltd and Walcon Marine Ltd, who had worked on the project, before unveiling a commemorative plaque and taking lunch with Members.

The eight-month project included the construction of a new quay wall, a capital dredge to give full tidal access, a new slipway and re-positioning pontoons to create enhanced berthing facilities.

The Haven includes a much needed disabled persons access, an ecologically sound 'living wall' for invertebrates and, overall, the development will provide added flood protection to the village of Hamble.

Commodore Mansfield commented: "The Prince Philip Yacht Haven would never have been completed without the unstinting generosity and tolerance of Members, who deserve our unreserved thanks. Nor would it have been delivered without the foresight and impetus of Members from both Clubs who made up the Haven Group, or the contractors selected to bring it to fruition. It is truly a world class facility which will transform the sailing opportunities for both Clubs."

The Royal Southern Yacht Club has enjoyed Royal patronage since its formation in 1837. A Member for 67 years, H.R.H. The Duke of Edinburgh was gracious enough to accept an invitation to become Admiral of the Club in 1952 and became its Patron in 2002.

Pendennis Wet Basin & Dock completed four weeks early

Thanks to the considerable efforts of the Southern Division's site team involved in the construction of Pendennis Shipyard Wet Basin and Dock in Falmouth, the new wet basin was handed over four weeks earlier than originally programmed.

The early handover has provided the client with early operation of their new facilities, and they have taken immediate use of this by anchoring two large super yachts in the dock where they can fit masts and superstructures. A third vessel is due in the basin shortly. This £7.8m project has delivered significant new marine facilities and is an exemplar project in respect of:

- Value engineering during an 18-month pre-construction stage to achieve the project's budget and exceed Pendennis Shipyard's aspirations in all respects.
- Building and maintaining relationships between parties with a focused approach and careful forward planning and co-operation in order to achieve the best possible outcome for the budget.
- Designing out project and safety risks and creating opportunities through the two-stage tender process at project outset.
- Improved value for money and achievement of programme through re-sequencing of works and 'thinking outside the box' with regard to alternative methods to provide greater efficiency.
- Consultation and co-operation with regulatory authorities and key stakeholders to achieve the best possible outcome for the built environment.
- Engagement of our key supply chain at an early stage to assist with alternative methods of construction and improve efficiency.
- How to manage construction in a Special Area of Conservation including study, management, relocation and protection of the sea-grass.
- Outstanding safety performance with no reportable injuries on site and only one minor first aid incident.
- Exemplary construction management to account for differences between the production rates expected at tender stage and what was actually being achieved on site.



At a recent ICE presentation given at Falmouth, the project team welcomed over 50 delegates to an evening lecture and site tour to learn all about the project. Positive comments were received the following day, as a member of Cornwall Council said "it was one of the best ICE events that I have attended".

This project is technically the most complex and challenging ever undertaken by the Southern Division and will undoubtedly open doors for similar work in the future. Thanks to the site team who worked tirelessly to ensure the project's success: Clive Thomas, contracts manager, Joe Morley, senior site manager, Brian Elderfield, site manager, Chris Terry, site supervisor, Chris Williams, site engineer, and David Jenkins, senior quantity surveyor.

New contract awards for Southern Division

The Southern Division's work in hand has soared to £20.5m following the award of several new contracts in May and June, including the largest single value project ever won in the history of Raymond Brown Construction Ltd.

The £10.2m project in Reading is the highest single value contract ever won by Raymond Brown Construction Ltd. The tender submission was praised highly by the client in subsequent interviews and meetings, its success was due to knowing exactly what the client wanted in terms of assurance, technical capability and programme.

Well done to the bid team involved in putting it together; Duncan Glen, operations manager, Richard Hall, divisional estimator, Mark Stanyon, contracts manager and Mark Kettle, submissions manager.

The £1.3m contract for the resurfacing of Shoppers 1 Car Park at the Dolphin Shopping Centre in Poole for the Borough of Poole was also recently awarded, and the construction works have now commenced on site. The tender was awarded to Raymond Brown based hugely on its extensive quality submission which was led by David Poole, bid manager, with Jon Hughes, estimator, Mark Stanyon and Mark Kettle.

Due to its high-profile location, considerable thought had to be given to the impact which these essential works might have on all stakeholders.

Ben Alford, senior site manager is managing the contract, and as the car park has to be closed for four months to enable the works to be carried out, is working hard to ensure that local relationships are enhanced and that disruption is kept to a minimum.



The £800k Haslar Bridge refurbishment in Portsmouth was also awarded in June, through Hampshire County Council's SE7 Framework. The project has already started and is being managed by Rob Green, site manager.



A ribbon-cutting ceremony saw the official opening of the new £1.1m recycling facility in Nursling. Skilfully assisted by local children from Nursling Primary School, the Test Valley Mayor and local councillors cut the ribbon and officially opened the site alongside Raymond Brown directors.

Raymond Brown hosted an open day on site, welcoming 100 local school children from both Nursling Primary and Fairisle Junior Schools during the day and local residents, customers and staff in the evening.

During the day, three groups of school children visited the site; two classes from Fairisle Junior School in the morning and one class from Nursling Primary School in the afternoon.

Upon arrival, the children were given an introduction to safety by Nick Muir, compliance manager, who explained the importance of personal protective equipment and safety on site through an interactive game.

Raymond Brown staff then helped them put on their own equipment, which consisted of hard hats and mini hi-vis vests. The children were taken up by coach to a pre-designed viewing platform north of the site, from where they could view the entire facility and operations taking place.

Justin Ebbutt, the Nursling Recycling Facility site manager took them through the site operations and explained the materials which are recycled by Raymond Brown whilst the children completed their customised site worksheets.









The classes were then driven down into the site and around the facility so they could see close up how the waste is segregated and recycled.

Last month, the children from both schools were invited to use their imagination to come up with poster designs for two new skip lorries, based around the theme of 'Reduce, Reuse, Recycle'. Raymond Brown Waste Solutions received a number of entries and the directors selected the posters which they felt best communicated messages promoting the importance of recycling.

The winning designs were recently printed onto the skip lorry cabs. Both the Fairisle Junior School and Nursling Primary School Iorries are now running out of the Nursling Recycling Facility and were unveiled to the children during their site visit.

Steve Clasby, managing director, announced the winners and presented them all with a £10 book voucher. The children were given the opportunity to sit in the lorry and have their photos taken during their visit.

All 100 children were allowed to keep their vests to help keep them safe when walking to school or riding their bikes, and were given a brownSkips.com goody bag before leaving the facility.

I am pleased to say that planning permission was granted in May 2014 after a unanimous committee decision by Hampshire County Council with no local community objections to the plans."

Steve Clasby, managing director said: "This new facility provides us with the opportunity to offer brownSkips.com to a wider market and provide an efficient tip and collect service, allowing customers to tip inert material whilst collecting quality aggregates, ready mixed concrete and soil at the same time.

Overall, we will be helping to increase the county's recycling rates, promoting waste recycling in the local community and further increasing employment opportunities."

The 1.6 hectare site just north of the M27, has the ability to process 75,000 tonnes per annum of non-hazardous commercial and industrial waste.



A year's worth of development and consultation followed the initial planning proposal back in 2012 and no concerns or issues were raised by stakeholders throughout this process. The local authority provided pre-application advice, making suggestions and modifications to the initial proposal, including a woodland management plan funded by Raymond Brown.

The construction works were undertaken by the Raymond Brown Construction Ltd Southern Division. Terry Churchill, site agent and Colin Potter, senior engineer, managed the works, ensuring that the site remained open for business whilst they were being undertaken.

The works comprised of the new 20m x 36m three sided steel frame building and included a number of improvements and remodelling works to the existing site. These include; safety parking zones for vehicles, car parking, pedestrian routes in and around the facility, concrete hardstanding areas, numerous aggregate bays, a double wash-down facility, M&E fit-out, two new weighbridges and landscaping works.

The open day was deemed a huge success, residents and customers arrived in the evening to be taken on site tours and speak with experienced members of the Raymond Brown Waste Solutions team. The feedback was extremely positive from all who attended.









The four-year Intermediate Construction Framework to deliver local authority building projects across Hampshire, the Isle of Wight and Reading on projects ranging between £500,000 and £4 million.

Most of the projects consist mainly of extensions, refurbishments and alterations to existing schools. The framework is also available for use by Fire, Police and NHS authorities. Due to start in August this year, it will also be offered to other local authorities.

The Hampshire Intermediate Construction Framework aims to improve the predictability of project out-turn cost, programme and quality by the early collaborative involvement of the contractors in the project design and project management.

The remaining incinerated bottom ash (IBA) is being turned into 75,000 tonnes of IBA aggregate to be put into the construction industry by Raymond Brown Aggregates each year.

A short film created by Raymond Brown, in partnership with Viridor, demonstrates how the facility operates.

The group and guests took a tour of the facility to see the leadingedge technology being deployed to use waste as fuel, producing enough electrical power for 38,000 homes, equivalent to more than two-thirds of Oxford. Guests also enjoyed the new ERF Education and Visitor Centre, where they met with students and teachers from Chesterton and Fritwell primary schools.

The centre includes the fearsome 'Megawattosaurus' (pictured), a life-size model dinosaur created entirely using waste materials recovered from the Household Waste Recycling Centre operated by Viridor in Ardley. Some of the finest fossilised dinosaur trackways ever found in Europe, left by Megalosaurus and Cetiosaurs, have been discovered on Ardley Quarry floor, and this fascinating site history is included in the visitor experience.

Ian McAulay, Viridor Chief Executive, said: "The Duke showed great interest in the development of this site and it's great to see Viridor's latest energy recovery facility at Ardley already providing a firstclass service to our local authority and business customers.

"By working in long-term partnership with our clients, we're transforming what some see as 'waste' into vital renewable energy for the UK. Our ERFs ensure that we extract every ounce of value from what people throw away, complementing the vital recycling services provided by councils and their contractors. I thank everyone for their hard work in delivering this world-class project."

The new state-of-the-art facility which opened in May of this year and is now fully operational, has the capacity to process up to 125,000 tonnes of IBA from the Hampshire Energy Recovery Facilities.

Raymond Brown Aggregates are recycling the IBA into a sustainable product to be used as an aggregate in construction, helping to divert 93% of Hampshire's municipal residual waste away from landfill.

Raymond Brown has welcomed local school children to its Rookery Farm Aggregate Recycling Facility near Fareham to coincide with National Recycling Awareness Week for the seventh year running.

The initiative, which includes class lessons at their own schools, a site tour of the Aggregate Recycling Facility and activities at Bursledon Brickworks, has directly educated over 1,500 children aged 7-9 years.

The Raymond Brown organised event covers a range of learning objectives from the Key Stage Two National Curriculum, targeting Geography, History, Science, Maths and Citizenship.

This year, a total of 150 children from Parkgate and Whiteley Primary Schools took part. The interactive lessons at both the schools and onsite focused on rocks, soils and recycling awareness.



On the site visit to Rookery Farm, the classes were divided into two groups; the first group were fitted with hard hats and hi-vis vests and then taken on a tour of the recycling facility, which included the class being weighed on the weighbridge.

The second group remained within the education centre to undertake various activities including a science investigation, involving testing aggregate properties, and covering key topics such as health and safety and the local environment. The children were encouraged to write their own individual promises to the environment which are all displayed within the education centre.

The Household Waste Recycling Centre provides facilities for the disposal of a range of recyclable materials and waste. These facilities are available to all residents for general household and garden waste. The site was successfully opened on the 1 April 2015 and has a new waste disposal contractor FCC Environment who are operating and managing the site.

Torfaen Council has had numerous positive responses from members of the public in relation to the layout at the new site. Recycling rates have already increased significantly over the first month and all efforts will go some way to meeting the statutory recycling targets set by Welsh Government.

Community-owned Wind Turbine complete

The community-owned wind turbine between Grimethorpe, Cudworth and Shafton has now been completed. This is the second scheme that Raymond Brown Renewables have completed for Energy 4 All, who develop community wind power schemes.

Local residents joined forces to raise the £1m in a scheme run by Four Winds Energy Co-operative, to fund the 500kW turbine, which will now be able to generate enough electricity to power 370 households.

The power harnessed from the site, off Ferrymoor Lane, will be sold directly back to the National Grid to return revenue to those who invested into the community fund.

Paul Rea, chairman of Four Winds, said: "Local, individual investors got involved from pledging as little as £250 and people generally see a return that is significantly higher than anything a high street bank or building society can offer. This is reclaimed colliery land and we are pleased that it has been able to give a new energy use to the area and it is due to export electricity to the National Grid at the end of this month."

Planning & Delivering Safe Work

A significant investment is currently being made in training the division's staff to undertake new safety-critical roles being introduced by Network Rail. Rail procedures are also being changed to reflect the new roles that are being introduced.

Eurotunnel's Folkestone International Terminal

The Rail Division has recently completed the first of seven nine-day possessions to replace defective block paving on the loading platforms at Eurotunnel's Folkestone International Terminal.

The works undertaken in the first possession, included removing 1,200m² of block paving and replacing with asphalt paving, consisting of a regulating course, geogrid membrane, base course and wearing course. Completion of possession works on time is critical to Eurotunnel's operations, the division were pleased to be able to complete within eight of the nine available days, despite vehicle access to the terminal being restricted by Operation Stack (partial closure of the M20).





Napier Road Subway

A contract has been secured from Reading Borough Council to reopen a derelict tunnel under the Great Western mainline railway in order to provide a new pedestrian and cycle link between Napier Road and Kenavon Drive. The proposed link will provide the connection to the existing, and planned residential and retail areas, just South of the railway.

Planning works have commenced on the £400k contract, with site works due to commence late August 2015.

Tapnage Tunnel Brickwork Repairs

Works have recently been completed to repair defective brickwork at Tapnage Rail Tunnel between Botley and Fareham Stations for Osborne, as part of their Wessex MFF.

Approximately, £400k of repair works have been undertaken, including the replacement of defective brickwork up to 13½ inches deep in the soffit of the tunnel. All work was carried out during track possessions with temporary works to retain the new brickwork in place, enabling the mortar to set and cure.





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
